What Household Items Can Be Recycled?*

Did you know that when you put something non-recyclable in your curbside recycling bin, it might cause problems at the processing facility? Avoid common mistakes by checking the list of recyclables below and making sure all your recyclables are clean and rinsed.

Yes

Place these items in the Recycling Bin

- Aluminum Cans
- Cereal & Other Dry Food Boxes
- Flattened Cardboard
- Gift Tissue Paper
- Gift Wrapping Paper
- Glass Jars & Bottles
- Junk Mail
- Magazines & Catalogs
- Newspapers
- Office & Mixed Paper
- Paper Bags
- Paper Egg Cartons
- Plastic Containers #1-7
- Telephone Books
- Tin & Steel Cans

* Additional items may be recyclable. Contact your hauler for a complete list of all materials accepted in your area.

These are common contaminants to the recycling process

Place these items in the Trash:

- Aluminum Foil or Plastic Wrap
- Broken Ceramic Dishes or Cups
- Broken Drinking or Window Glass
- Contaminated Food Containers (pizza boxes with oil, food, or grease)
- Diapers or Feminine Products
- Disposable Plates, Cups & Utensils
- Disposable Razors
- Facial Tissues or Toilet Paper
- Incandescent Light Bulbs
- Waxed Cardboard

Look for opportunities to reuse or donate these materials. Only as a last resort should these items be placed in the Trash:

- Carpet & Furniture
- Plastic Bags
- Shoes & Clothing
- Styrofoam
- Wire or Plastic Hangers
- Wood or Vinyl Products

These items require special disposal at your local Household Hazardous Waste Facility:

- Batteries
- Chemicals & Cleaners
- Computers & Electronics
- Fluorescent Tubes/Bulbs
- Home Generated Sharps
