



Reportable Conditions: Notification by Healthcare Providers
Title 17, California Code of Regulations (CCR), Section 2500
 (07/05/2011)

What to Report

California Code of Regulations, Title 17, Section 2500, requires healthcare providers knowing of or in attendance on a case or suspected case of any of the diseases or conditions listed below to report to the local health department within the indicated timeframe:

Report Immediately by Telephone:

- Anthrax, human or animal
- Botulism (infant, foodborne, wound, other)
- Brucellosis, human (all *Brucella* spp.)
- Cholera
- Ciguatera Fish Poisoning
- Dengue
- Diphtheria
- Domoic Acid Poisoning (Amnesic Shellfish Poisoning)
- Escherichia coli*: shiga toxin producing (STEC) including *E. coli* O157
- Hantavirus Infections
- Hemolytic Uremic Syndrome
- Measles (Rubeola)
- Meningococcal Infections
- Paralytic Shellfish Poisoning
- Plague, human or animal
- Rabies, human or animal
- Scombroid Fish Poisoning
- Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome (SARS)
- Shiga toxin (detected in feces)
- Smallpox (Variola)
- Tularemia, human
- Viral Hemorrhagic Fevers, human or animal (e.g., Crimean-Congo, Ebola, Lass, and Marburg viruses)
- Yellow Fever
- Occurrences of Any Unusual Diseases
- Outbreaks of Any Diseases (including diseases not listed in Title 17 Section 2500)

Report by FAX, Telephone, or Mail within 1 Working Day of Identification:

- Amebiasis
- Babesiosis
- Campylobacteriosis
- Chickenpox (Varicella) (only hospitalizations and deaths)
- Cryptosporidiosis
- Encephalitis, Specify Etiology: Viral, Bacterial, Fungal, Parasitic
- Foodborne Disease

- Haemophilus influenzae*, Invasive Disease (<15 years of age)
- Hepatitis A
- Listeriosis
- Malaria
- Meningitis, Specify Etiology : Viral, Bacterial, Fungal, Parasitic
- Pertussis (Whooping Cough)
- Poliovirus Infection
- Psittacosis, human
- Q Fever
- Relapsing Fever
- Salmonellosis (Other than Typhoid Fever)
- Shigellosis
- Staphylococcus aureus* Infection (only in a case resulting in death or admission to an ICU in a person who has not been hospitalized or had surgery, dialysis, or residency in a long-term care facility in the past year and did not have an indwelling catheter or percutaneous medical device at the time of culture)
- Streptococcal Infections (outbreaks of any type and individual cases in food handlers and dairy workers only)
- Syphilis
- Trichinosis
- Tuberculosis
- Typhoid Fever, Cases and Carriers
- Varicella, Hospitalizations/Deaths
- Vibrio* Infections
- West Nile Virus (WNV) Infection
- Yersiniosis

Report by FAX, Telephone, or Mail within 7 Days of Identification:

- Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS)
- Anaplasmosis/Ehrlichiosis
- Brucellosis, animal (except infections due to *B. canis*)
- Chancroid
- Chlamydia trachomatis* infections, including lymphogranuloma venereum (LGV)
- Coccidioidomycosis

- Creutzfeldt-Jakob Disease (CJD) and other Transmissible Spongiform Encephalopathies (TSE)
- Cyclosporiasis
- Cysticercosis or Taeniasis
- Giardiasis
- Gonococcal Infections
- Hepatitis B (specify acute or chronic)
- Hepatitis C (specify acute or chronic)
- Hepatitis D (specify acute or chronic)
- Hepatitis E
- Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV) Infection
- Influenza, ICU admission or deaths
- Influenza, Novel Strains (human)
- Legionellosis
- Leprosy (Hansen Disease)
- Leptospirosis
- Lyme Disease
- Mumps
- Pelvic Inflammatory Disease (PID)
- Rickettsial Diseases (non-Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever), including Typhus and Typhus-like Illness
- Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever
- Rubella (German Measles)
- Rubella Syndrome, Congenital
- Tetanus
- Toxic Shock Syndrome
- Tularemia, animal
